

## COWICHAN VALLEY REGIONAL HOSPITAL DISTRICT

The Cowichan Valley Regional Hospital District (CVRHD) provides capital funding to Island Health for the following facilities:

- Cowichan District Hospital
- Quw'utsun Hulutun-ew't-hw/Quw'utsun Valley Hospital (*new hospital build*)
- Cairnsmore Place
- Ladysmith Community Health
- Chemainus Health Care Centre

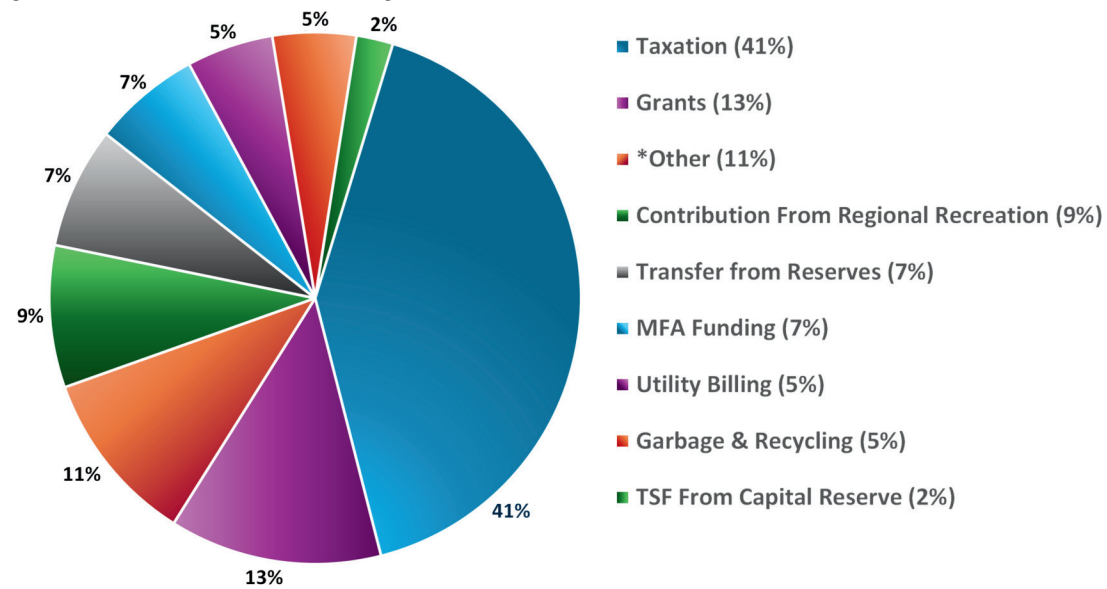
Capital funding of the new hospital build is cost-shared, with the province funding 60% and the CVRHD funding 40%.

Since 2010, the CVRHD has been reserving funds to meet its 40% contribution.

Construction began in 2022 and it is anticipated that the hospital will be ready to welcome the first patients into the new facility in 2027.

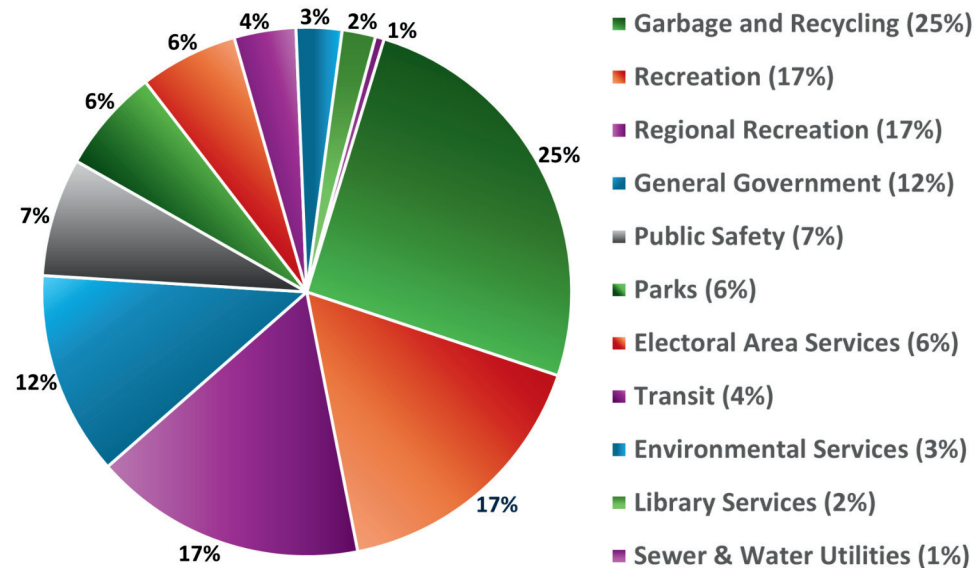


## HOW REGIONAL DISTRICT SERVICES ARE FUNDED (REVENUE SOURCES)

## Message From The Chair

The Cowichan Valley Regional District spans from the Nanaimo Airport in the north to the Malahat in the south, and from the west coast of Vancouver Island to Valdes Island in the east. It includes 9 Electoral Areas and 4 Municipalities, working together to deliver 178 services to more than 89,000 residents.

Each year, the Board’s job is to balance cost with the services people rely on every day. Services like emergency response, water and sewer, recreation, waste management, environmental protection and community services.

This year, the Board set a clear direction to keep tax increases as low as possible. This budget was the result of a collaborative effort between elected officials and staff, going through services one by one to find savings while protecting the service levels our communities depend on. It required careful decisions on where we could adjust and where we could not.

We continue to face ongoing pressures: population growth, aging infrastructure, increasing costs passed down from other levels of government, and the need to set aside reserves for future infrastructure upgrades. Being pragmatic now, and saving for what we know is coming, helps avoid sharper tax impacts down the road. These pressures are not going away, and we will continue to advocate for fair support from senior governments.

Our focus remains the same: keep communities functioning, plan responsibly for the future, and be transparent about the choices in front of us.

## Understanding Your Tax Notice

You have just received your Property Tax Notice from the Province of BC. The province collects taxes for schools, roads, policing, Regional District services and the Regional Hospital District.

The following will explain each line on your property tax notice:

### Provincial Services:

#### Provincial School Tax

The Province collects this tax for education and school facilities.

#### Provincial Rural Tax and Police Tax

The Provincial Government tax is for rural road maintenance provided by the Province and police protection services.

### Local Services:

#### Area D Cowichan Valley

This is your electoral area tax for services provided by the CVRD.

#### Cowichan Valley Hospital

The CVRHD provides capital funding for the hospital facilities in this region.

#### BC Assessment

BC Assessment Authority is a crown corporation that sets all property values in the province. Its costs are recovered by this tax.

#### Municipal Finance Authority

The Municipal Finance Authority coordinates financial borrowing for all local governments in the province.

#### Specified Local Services

Property owners within the following areas will be assessed these taxes per \$100,000 assessed value:
